This letter is in follow up to the conversation you had with today. As I reviewed with you, it was discovered today that an email containing some of your personal information was mistakenly emailed to an individual's email on 9/19/23, rather than Blue Cross/Blue Shield as part of your new employee medical insurance enrollment. The information disclosed included the following:

- Your name, physical address, e-mail address, phone number, date of birth, social security number, utility bill and banking information (account number was redacted by the bank).

name, address, date of birth, social security number and automotive insurance policy number

Measures were taken to recall the email, however that did not appear to be successful. We have outreached to the individual to ask them not to view the email and to delete it. We are still making attempts to confirm with him that this has been done. We will be working with the team to explore ways to prevent an occurrence like this from happening again in the future.

We are deeply sorry for this error.

Given the type of information that was included in the email, we do advise that you take the following steps:

Call the toll-free numbers of any of the three major credit bureaus (below) to place a fraud alert on
your credit report. This can help prevent an identity thief from opening additional accounts in your
name. As soon as the credit bureau confirms your fraud alert, the other two credit bureaus will
automatically be notified to place alerts on your credit report, and all three bureaus will provide you
a copy of your credit report free of charge.

- Remain vigilant by reviewing account statements and ordering your credit reports. By establishing a fraud alert, you will receive a follow-up letter that will explain how you can receive a free copy of your credit report. When you receive your credit report, examine it closely and look for signs of fraud, such as credit accounts that are not yours.
- Continue to monitor your credit reports. Even though a fraud alert has been placed on your account, you should continue to monitor your credit reports to ensure an imposter has not opened an account with your personal information.

We are committed to lessen the harm this may cause you by helping ensure that this information is not used inappropriately, and so will cover the cost for one year for you and your significant other to receive credit monitoring. To take advantage of this offer, please call me, vithin 60 days.

We apologize for the stress and worry this situation may cause you. We are committed to keeping your information safe and assure you we are doing everything possible to ensure this does not happen in the future.
